Consider Sensory Responses...

Ideas for Churches:

- Appoint Someone to be in Charge
 - A Special Needs Coordinator is very important.
- Get to know the individual
 - Unwrap the package!
- Think along with that individual
- Make a plan
- Remember the Puzzle Piece perspective
 - Spend more time on green areas than pink
 - If I didn't _____ it, you didn't ____ it.

Thinking through the areas of difference:

- Repetitive Themes and Behaviors
 - Difference between OCD and ASD
 - Use the areas of interest
 - Interview the expert
 - Pairing with non-preferred task
 - Putting boundaries around a topic
 - The power of sticky notes
 - A box in the closet
- Desire for Sameness
 - Visual schedules for individuals

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- Frist...Then
- Real Object schedule
- Binder schedule
- Making changes to the schedule
 - Give advanced preparation and warning
 - Preview of the church
 - Church Welcome Story
 - Time Timer
 - Create Transition Routines
 - Carry an object
- Language
 - Watch your language
 - Wall Wording
 - Tips on wording
 - Use an “interpreter” and create a “dictionary”
 - Say what you WANT the individual to DO, avoid the negatives
 - Give directions one step at a time
 - Pair visuals with words
 - Great reading does NOT always mean great comprehension
 - Jokes, sarcasm, multiple-meaning words can leave individuals “in the dust”
- Sensory Differences
 - A brief explanation
 - Provide multisensory options
 - Get to know that individual and jump into that person’s shoes
 - Hearing
 - Provide sound blockers
 - Adjust the decibels
 - Provide a choice to leave
 - Change or alter noise
 - Turn an unexpected noise into an expected noise
 - Vision
 - Classroom tent
 - Tablecloth over a table
 - Un-decorate
 - Don’t always insist on eye contact
 - Proprioceptive
 - Weighted objects
 - Trampoline
 - Lotion
 - Brushing
 - Animal walks
 - Heavy box of books to the office or library

- Other ideas
 - Provide a fragrance-free area
 - Provide an “out” at greeting time
 - Deliver an object to someone
 - A job to do
 - Involve the individual in some way
 - Sound or set-up crew
 - Usher or bulletin distributor
 - Tips
 - Catch in individual before crossing the line
 - Break tickets
- Social/ Perspective-Taking Ability
 - Two sides of the same page
 - Teach behavior
 - Talking traffic lights
 - Remote controls
 - Digital cameras
 - Visiting a new environment
 - Steps toward full involvement
 - A plan for the individual
 - Use books and videos
 - Role play
 - Play detective
 - Social/informational stories
 - Information is critical
 - G.L.U.E. team
 - Emotions may not match the face!
 - A plan for the congregation
 - A plan for the leaders
